

M. Frey Sweeps Campus; Gaines, Herring Elected

Margaret Frey, the peoples choice for student body president, was elected last Friday in student body and Boys' and Girls' League elections, making her the second girl to achieve that high office. Loni Kiltie, elected in S'62, was the first female president of RHS.

Margaret stated that she wants "most of all to consider in full the desires of the student body." She will do this by utilizing suggestions placed in the suggestion boxes.

The president-elect campaigned with an eye toward closer communication ties between the student body and its student council. She also set more unity between the students and student government as one of her goals.

Assisting Margaret will be the newly-elected cabinet of S'66: Bruce Herring, Boys' League

president; Judy Gaines, Girls' League president; Steve Wasserman, executive vice president; Shari King, social vice president; Margaret Scott, recording secretary; Rosalie Rosenblot, corresponding secretary; and Judy Galuhn, treasurer.

Steve Snyder, Steve Sillman and Bob Underhill also campaigned for the office of president.

A key issue in the platform of each presidential candidate was the establishment of cabinet posts for tenth and eleventh grade representatives. If such posts are created, the representatives will be the first lowerclassmen on a heretofore all-senior student body cabinet.

Better communication between the student body and student council was also urged. Cabinet newsletters, columns in the REGENTS REVIEW, and classroom visitations were some of the possibilities suggested.

More noon-time activities and recreation was proposed by some candidates for the presidency.

Boys' and Girls' League officers for the spring semester were chosen by their respective leagues on Dec. 10. The new Boys' League cabinet consists of Jim Grey, treasurer; Paul Gates, secretary; and Dave Bersin, vice president. Female Regents elected Kerry Marsha's, historian; Ronna Zagon, corresponding secretary; Roni Wiesberg, recording secretary; and Lana Calvano, vice president.

While many worthwhile goals were mentioned by the candidates in their nomination speeches, nearly all spoke of the American freedom, voting. The importance of voting and its direct relationship to democracy was mentioned by several candidates. While some went so far as to say not to vote for themselves, all candidates urged registered Regents to get out and vote.

The president of the student body is the official representative of the students. At both school activities and administrative meetings, Margaret Frey will be the spokesman of Reseda High during S'66.

Cheer leader Elections are Set for Jan.3

The primary election for song and yell leaders is scheduled for Monday, Jan. 3, at noon in the Auditorium. Candidates will perform on the stage for the voters and final elections will be held on Wednesday, Jan. 5, during second period.

Screening took place in the school Auditorium last Tuesday. All candidates met before the screening committee, which consisted of cheer leader sponsors, activity co-ordinator, athletic co-ordinator, drill team sponsors, student body president, other cabinet members, and vice-principals.

Girl candidates tried out to the school fight song, "Come on Reseda." The boy candidates performed to "Whisper, Talk, and Yell." For the spring semester, 12 girls and 10 boys are selected by the screening committee for election.

Candidates for song and yell leader must have a "C" average with no D's, F's, or U's, or incompletes at the time of application.
