The Counselors' Office, located in the Administration Building, provides numerous services designed to "keep students progressing along correctly to achieve their majors," according to Mr. Robert Barrus, assistant head counselor.

By guiding students in their choice of a major sequence and seeing that the major is completed by the A12, counselors try to prepare a student for a career or job. Counselors also assist college-bound students by seeing that they fulfill entrance requirements. Helping students prepare for college may involve participation in the school's testing program, which includes the administration of State tests, individual tests to determine students' interests, abilities, and aptitudes, the National Merit Exam, the
