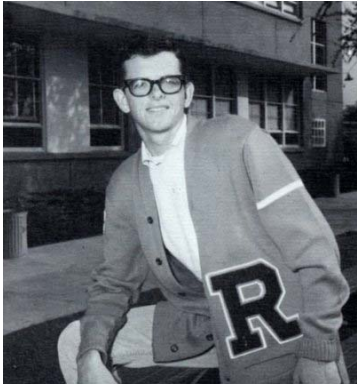
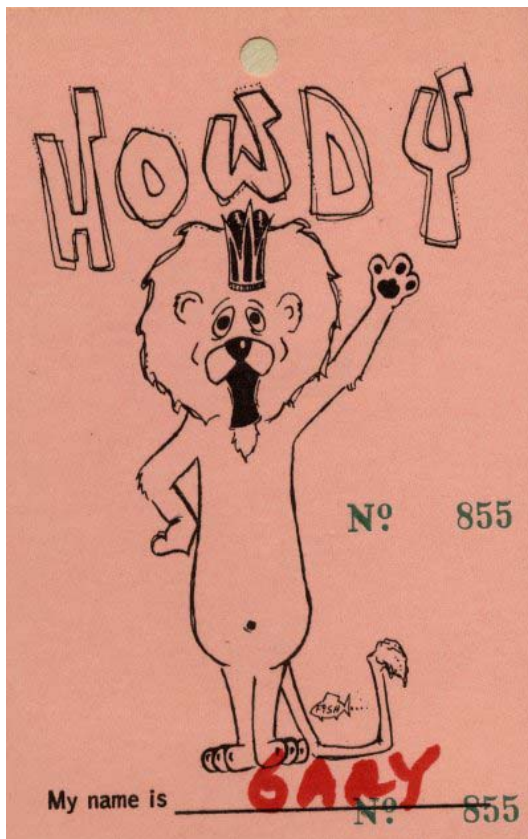


Boys' League / Boys' Week and Howdy Hop

High School Men to Take Over Civic Government

Thousands of outstanding young men from Los Angeles City High Schools, including 60 Regents, will be given the opportunity to fill many of the highest offices of municipal government and industry in the 44th annual observance of Boys' Week.

The theme for the week of May 2 will be "Building Better Boys."

Because of the need to reduce interruptions on campus, all activities that would constitute Reseda's recognition of the week will be held on Boys' Day, May 3.

Traditionally, students have taken over administration posts in school. The boys doing so this year are Dave Bersin, principal; Mike Murphy, boys' vice principal; Steve Sandifer, girls' vice principal; Steve Gillespie, registrar; Paul Gates, head counselor; Dean Teves, activity coordinator; John Lee, boys' vice principal's secretary; Bob Dick, librarian;

On the municipal scale, Bruce Herring, A-12, will act as District Superior Court Judge, while other Regents will take over additional civic positions.

Herring, Boys' League president, stated that "The purpose of Boys' Week and Boys' Day is to give young men a chance in 'big-time' government." This he feels will give them an opportunity to see ahead and plan careers.
