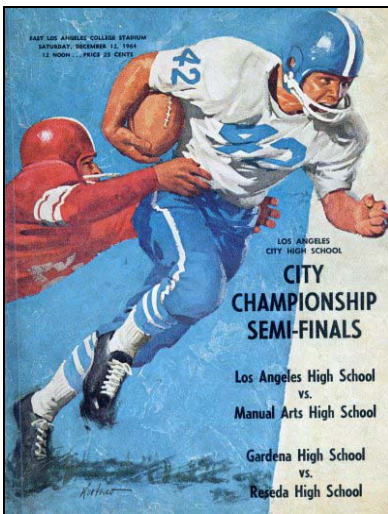
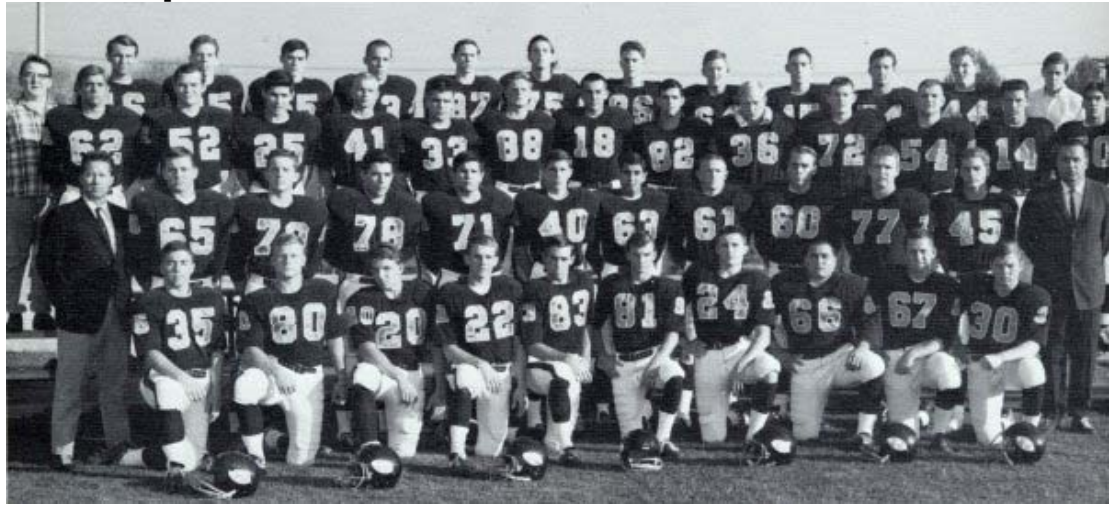
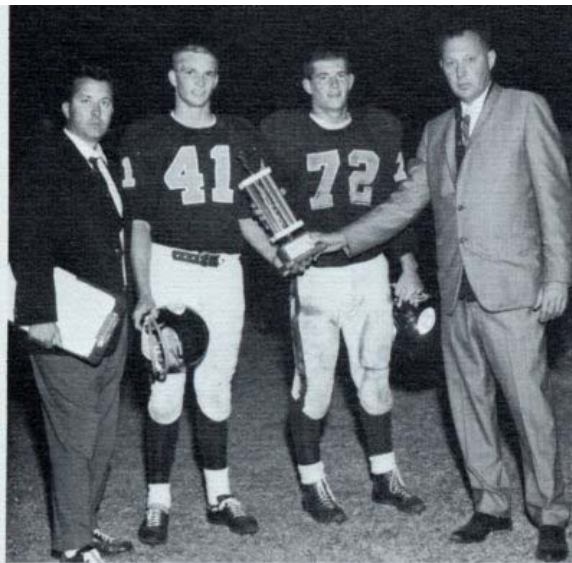


Sports Memories: Football



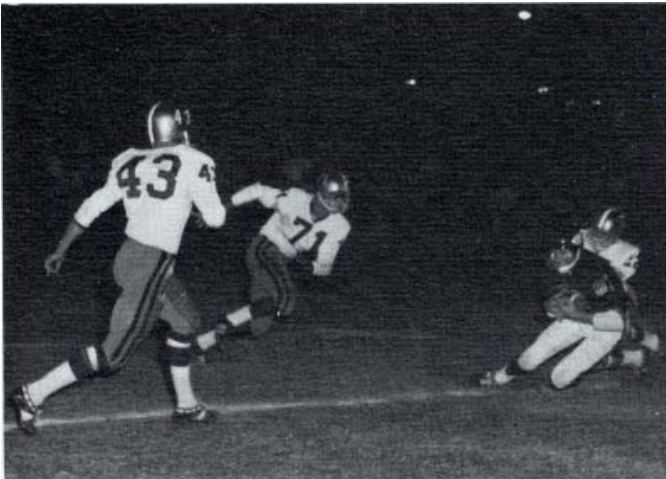

Season Summary

RESEDA 13	Monroe 7	The season opener showed a strong Reseda team with the emphasis on defense, and they defeated a well balanced Monroe team, on the two touchdowns of Bob Juba.
RESEDA 0	Granada 12	The next week, a stubborn Granada Hills defense left the Regents scoreless, while the Highlanders pushed over for two touchdowns.
RESEDA 7	Chatsworth 6	The second league encounter of the season showed the Regents coming out on top over an inspired Chatsworth team. The only Regent score came on a 28 yard halfback pass from Bob Juba to Randy Hutton.
RESEDA 6	Birmingham 7	The game against Birmingham was off to a quick start when Birmingham ran back the opening kickoff for a touchdown. The game was loaded with frustration for the Regents, as they were inside the Brave 20 yard line five times but failed to score.
RESEDA 21	San Fernando 19	The next game, a non-league encounter with San Fernando, the scoring was extremely close. The Regents came through in the fourth quarter for the winning margin.
RESEDA 14	Cleveland 18	In this game the Cleveland defense held the Regents to two touchdowns, while their offense was busy scoring three touchdowns behind their strong aerial attack.
RESEDA 19	Canoga Park 0	With a near capacity homecoming crowd on hand, the Regents showed their scoring power and a flawless defense. They soundly defeated the Hunters by pushing over three Regent touchdowns.
RESEDA 7	Taft 13	In the last league game of the 1965 football season, the Regent squad had an "upset" on their minds as they held the West Valley League Champions scoreless for three and one half quarters. Then Taft clicked for two touchdowns giving them the winning margin. The Regents score came on a 94 yards kickoff return by Bob Juba at the start of the second half.
